Visit of Grant Montgomery, President of Family Care Foundation



The month of a long, intensive course was taught by Chefs Alvaro Valenzuela and Patricia Ojeada, other teachers: Ana Perez, Mauricio Donders and Academic Director Hugo Avila. They were all hired after the course by the same Company.

Wheelchair Distribution: On this occasion we asked the wheelchair recipients if they'd be willing to participate in a study that Free Wheel Chair Mission was doing to find ways to better help the disabled.



Maria, 43 years old, was one of the beneficiaries who participated in this study. At 3 years old she contracted polio which left her disabled in both legs. She lives alone with her daughter and 2 year old grandson who suffers from a delicate heart condition. Maria was very thankful for the wheelchair as she has to care for her grandson so that her daughter can work. She takes him to preschool and has learned to take care of herself and get around with the wheelchair.

She told us, "I'm so happy because now I can take my grandson with me on the chair and since there's is a harness we both hold on and have a great time. Thank you so much. It's been a very valuable gift" Afterwards she went to get her grandson at the preschool and an hour later she was back again, this time carrying her grandson on her lap so he could meet us.

This course, also was held with funding from the OTIC CORCIN, and was given to the Network for Invalids of Lo Espejo. They are a group of volunteers who attend to more than 1,000 invalids of very poor families in their homes.

The closing celebration was attended by Mayor Carlos Inostroza and other authorities of the community.

This year a delegation of 9 people from Free Wheelchair Mission and associates came to help distribute wheelchairs from one of the containers they'd sponsored. They wanted to get to know some of the people who'd be receiving the wheelchairs, and share the message that it was a gift of God's love for them.

The first place we visited was Lampa, where we delivered 10 wheelchairs at people's homes. We spent some very warm, emotional moments with each of them and their families. One of them invited us into his little farmhouse and showed us his prize vine with huge beautiful red grapes. He gave us several bunches to say thanks and they were delicious. Overall we really felt the warmth and affection of the Chilean people.



- Photo 1. Juan Sandoval 72 years old, became disabled as a child due to polio. He lives with some neighbors who "adopted" him when his mother died and he's now a part of their family. He's got a great sense of humor and became very cheerful when he got his wheelchair since he likes to go out to the plaza and spend time with people.
- Photo 2. Alejandrina Farias, 7 years ago she had a stroke which left her unable to walk. She fell into a deep depression. To cheer her up her husband found a tricycle which he rigged as best he could to take her for walks. They were so happy to get this wheelchair.

Juana Pinchulef suffers from cancer and has become immobilized. She says she'll go for walks with her children now. Domitila Godoy was hit by a car which left her paralyzed from the waist down. She wept as she received her wheelchair, telling us "I can't believe people would come all the way from another country to bring me this chair. I'm so touched."

Photo 3. Maria de los Ángeles, with her adopted son David and Dick from the USA. David was so happy that his mom received a wheelchair. He works as a food server in a Brazilian restaurant and he had a good time practicing his Portuguese with Dick who'd lived in Brazil for 18 years. Before we left he said he wanted to give Dick a gift that meant a lot to him and he brought a special "mate" (A kind of tea cup) with an Argentine soccer team's emblem on it. It was very touching.





Distribution of 35 wheelchairs in the Community Padre Hurtado





Working with the mayor in the Community Padre Hurtado we donated 35 wheelchairs. FWM's delegation won everyone's hearts. When the folkloric band who'd been invited to the ceremony started to play and invited the audience to dance, they got up and joined in the dancing enthusiastically. The local families loved them for it because they said it showed that not only did the "gringos" care for them physically by bringing them a wheelchair, but they also respected and enjoyed the Chilean culture. When we told the recipients "These chairs are a gift from God for you because He loves you," they replied, "We believe you because we can see Him reflected in you."



Agueda and Amy with Mauricio Astudillo, 42, his sister Dina and a friend. When we went to say hi we were impressed with how affectionate and thankful they were. Mauricio smiled at everyone, very friendly and relaxed like a big kid. Dina told us that she's the oldest of 10 siblings. All of her young brothers and sister were born with a genetic disease that developed at about the 9th month in the womb. (She was born premature at only 6 months so she never developed it.) None of the doctors ever explained to her parents that it was a genetic problem, they only realized when one after another of their children began suffering from this degenerative disorder and that left them disabled or eventually killed them. It was very traumatic to go through that with nearly all their children. Eventually their parents passed away as well leaving Dina with 5 siblings to care for.

"It was very hard to watch them suffer and die one at a time," she told us with tears in her eyes. "Now there's only Mauricio and one other brother who is a complete invalid left. It's been a lot of work, and very painful, but I won't complain because they're so loving and thankful that it's easy to care for them." Mauricio was so happy with his chair, he can't speak much and he's almost deaf but he told us with signs how thankful he was. We told Dina: "You're the angel from God for your family. You've been fulfilling such an important mission in caring for them." She nodded and answered, "Yes, I know. When my brothers pass away I want to study nursing so that I can keep taking care of people." We offered for her to come get her training at our school whenever she could, which she appreciated a lot since she doesn't have the means to pay for a school.

One of the inmates was very excited and asked if he could say some words of appreciation in the name of all of them. He delivered his speech in perfect English and even became so moved he wept a bit. He ended with a beautiful reflection on all he'd learned in his years in prison and the importance of being a good and true person.



Visit to Hospital Claudio Vicuña de San Antonio





We were received by the coordinating nurse Mrs. Angel Olivari, and the doctor on call with whom we visited the patients who would need a wheelchair when they were released from the hospital. We talked and prayed with them which they appreciated very much.

Photo1: A patient who we didn't know the name of because he hadn't spoken since arriving at the hospital. When we met and told him we had a gift for him, he thanked us and started talking to us. When the attending nurse saw that, she got very excited and called the doctor. It turns out that was the first time he'd spoken to anybody and answered their questions. They'd been unable to treat him fully as he didn't talk to anybody before. They all told us, "This is wonderful! Now we can finally help him." He kept talking to us and thanking us till we left the hospital.



Visit to the Senate of the Republic of Chile





Senator Juan Antonio Coloma, received the FWM delegation, gave them a tour of the Senate building and invited them to a luncheon in appreciation of their help to this country. In his region alone more that 1500 disabled poor people received mobility devices.



56 Wheelchairs in the Community of Lo Espejo

In the community of Lo Espejo we have a history of collaborative actions with the municipality. The FWM delegation also distributed clothing which they brought from the USA for the people in 2 of these shantytowns they have in the county. Special thanks to the help of the volunteers for the Network for the Disabled; they helped organize the clothing the Americans brought by family and coordinated the trip.

When we arrived he was lying in bed, enclosed in a tiny room with no light or ventilation. 

At 8 years old he was abandoned by his mother and adopted by Mrs. Blanca Rojas who took him in and treated him like one of her own children. (She is the woman in the photograph with him). She told us he's a very caring, good person. Due to secondary conditions caused by HIV, 10 years ago he lost the use of his legs. They were both very thankful for the wheelchair because every time he had a doctor appointment (which is pretty often) they had to ask around to borrow a wheelchair, and sometimes there were none available. Now he can go receive his medical treatments without that stress and get out of the house more often.

Photo **6**: **Emeregildo Rivera**, 72, became disabled due to the beatings and torture he suffered during the military coup 30 years ago. For 20 years he used crutches to get around but for the last 10 it's been very painful and he urgently needed a wheelchair. He was so thankful that someone had thought of him for this wheelchair, because he'd been trying for so long to get one. We told him, "God remembers you. You're very important to Him. He hasn't forgotten you." With tears in his eyes he replied, "Yes, it's true. Thank you so much and God bless you!"



Life Stories

I want to feel the sunshine on my face

Eduardo Enrique, 46, arrived at the foundation accompanied by Pablo, a former student at FEDES who worked with us assembling wheelchairs. We hadn't seen Pablo in a year and were happy to catch up. He introduced us to his friend and asked if he could get a wheelchair. Eduardo started showing signs of diabetes at 15, but in just the last year he'd become blind and immobilized. This threw him into a deep depression because he'd always been a hard worker and very active, and now his wife had to go to work all day to support them, leaving him alone in the dark house.

When we gave him his wheelchair he was so happy. He got settled into it and told us "Thank you!" with a big smile. After talking with him for a bit I realized that he had the sun shining directly on his face so I asked him if he'd like me to move him to the shade so the sun wouldn't bother him. He answered, "No please. It really doesn't bother me. I like it. I want to feel the sunshine on my face. I've been shut in for so long. It feels wonderful; I just want to drink it in. I can't tell you how thankful I am for this wheelchair because now my wife and brother can take me for walks, something I've been wanting for a long time. I can go now to the plaza and talk with my friends. It'll help me stay busy and not sit around just thinking so much. God bless you!

Left: This story was told to us by Officer Palma of the Police of San Bernardo. Their department is one of the many with whom we collaborate to distribute the wheelchairs to the most vulnerable of the economically disadvantaged in the Metropolis area.

Mrs. Ernestina was a victim of domestic violence. Her alcoholic husband beat her and wouldn't give her the money she needed to raise their children. After finally getting a restraining order to protect herself and her children she worked as a laundress to put food on the table. After years of this her hands developed severe arthritis which is so painful she's had to quit working and now can do very few things on her own. Now her daughters care for her. Officer Palma heard of her situation when her exhusband (who was dying) went to request permission from the police to visit Ernestina to ask for forgiveness for the years he'd mistreated her. When they went to the house to visit her, they were shocked at what they found. Her hands and legs were so disfigured she could hardly walk even to the bathroom. They called FEDES right way to ask if we could donate a walker for her. Ernestina was so happy when she received it because it means she can recover some of her mobility now.

Testimony of Juan Zamorano, 85.

He is disabled due to a variety of respiratory diseases and arthrosis which has left him unable to walk. He lives with his 72 year old wife in a room that the neighborhood committee rents to them. They support themselves by selling used clothing or other things people give them at the community fair. He wrote us this letter.

"The purpose of this letter is to thank you for giving me my wheelchair. I've been bedridden for a long time. Before you gave me the wheelchair my wife had to carry me in a cart. That's how she'd take me to the doctor, or to do paperwork or to visit family. I felt very badly to see the pain she had at this age struggling so that I wouldn't have to stay in bed all the time.

I never had the means to buy a wheelchair and had lost hope for ever having one because we're so poor and we don't have support from family or other public services. One day a policeman came here to visit me and after gently asking why I was bedridden he asked if he could take me out to the porch to get some sunshine. I agreed and he carried me out. My wife came out with us then told him to wait while she went inside to get a chair. Sargeant Vasquez told her she didn't need to because behind us there was a big surprise, and sure enough we turned around and there was the most beautiful wheelchair. Both my wife and I started crying of sheer and joy. He also gave us the message from you: to give thanks to God because it was a gift of His love that He prepared specially for us. We just hugged and hugged Sgt. Vasquez, thanking him so much for all of your generosity and help, which no one had ever given us before."



In the month of November, working with Senator Fransisco Chahuan we were able to give a donation of 700 wheelchairs, 200 walkers, 100 canes and 30 hospital beds to help the disabled poor in the Region of Viña del Mar.

After the ordeal he couldn't go back to work and the small pension he received wasn't enough to live on. He lives alone in a room that he rents from a family. He sells small items in the street to support himself. He was so thankful for the donation of the wheelchair. He told us, "Before I had to carry the bags of things to sell on my back and it was very exhausting to get around like that on crutches." He just kept on praising God for the chance to have a "vehicle" as he called it. "You can't imagine how this is going to change my life. Thank you so much. May God keep giving you strength to help people like me.

Photo 4: Juan Ugarte, 36 years old, was accompanied by his brother. Four years ago a degenerative disease which the doctors have not been able to diagnose set in. He's been waiting for a wheelchair ever since. When we told him the wheelchair was a gift of God's love for him, he nodded his head and told us, "I believe it! I also know that He's going to heal me some day and I will walk again. God bless you!"

Maria Mercedes Caceres, 80, has osteoporosis in her hips and can't walk. Her husband has cancer as well and they were both very thankful for the wheelchair as they were going to share it between them. They told us,

"God bless you for your noble work. People come here and always make promises to help, but they don't follow through. They give us hope and then let us down. God bless you and all people of good will who remember the aged and sick who don't have the means we need. We know God brought you and is here with us with these wheelchairs.
